We are interested in buying items similar to our stock listed here, and in anything unusual not suggested by our catalogue. We specialise particularly in art and literature relating to the Mimeograph Revolution, the Beat Generation, and the counterculture, as well as underground fiction and poetry generally. We issue two catalogues per year, in April and October.

This catalogue offers books and periodicals with contributions by Iain Sinclair, of which the majority were acquired from his collection. Sinclair's contributions, from his earliest published piece to the present day, highlight the trajectory or trajectories of his career. Books in various stages of composition come and go (and sometimes come back); the literary mainstream opens its doors (the underground being ever present); there are more interviews and more translations (in more languages); and the work continues to appear at an exponential rate. There are poems, short stories, fragments of fiction, essays, and critical pieces on films, books, art, and architecture. After a point, London is rarely far away. There is consistency underlying it all.

For information concerning the years 1960 to 1987, this catalogue has leant upon Jeff Johnson's bibliography of Sinclair's work, and it has incorporated Johnson's numbering for 'B' items (publications edited or published by Sinclair) and for 'C' items (his contributions). Johnson's combination of biography and bibliography, taking the two to be inseparable, has resulted in by far the most accurate study of Sinclair to date. Among other things, it is also a valuable resource on the British Poetry Revival, with its coverage of the 1970s being particularly vivid. Almost finished up to and including the year 1987, the bibliography will be published in stages by Test Centre Books, with a first announcement due in the next month or two.

By way of a disclaimer, any disparities between this catalogue and Johnson's bibliography will be minor.

- 1. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) PLATTS, D. A., GRIFFITH-JONES, J. M., WILLIAMS, J. M., ELLIOTT, N., and PAGE, G. F. (eds. include). The Cheltonian Winter 1960-Spring 1962 (in five volumes). Cheltenham: Darter's Bookshop (where stated), 1960-1962. 1st editions. 8vo then (Spring 1962 issue) 4to. Stapled wrappers. [40pp.]-[54pp.]. All of Sinclair's contributions to the Cheltenham College magazine, comprising the five earliest items to be formally included in Johnson's bibliography (the two earlier texts being Sinclair's juvenile newspaper The Maesteg Herald and, remembered by Sinclair, a contribution to a Cheltenham Preparatory School magazine). As follows: (Winter 1960) "The Captain's Paradise", reviewing Anthony Kimmins' film of that name; (Spring 1961) 'The Devil's Disciple', reviewing Guy Hamilton's film of that name; (Summer 1961) 'Huis Clos', reviewing Jacqueline Audry's film of that name, and the poem 'For Remembrance Sake'; (Winter 1961) ""Orphée", a review of Jean Cocteau's film of that name, the essay 'Impressions of Laugharne (Home of the poet Dylan Thomas)', and the poems 'An Apocalyptic Vision', 'Dawn', 'Night', and (co-written with 'T.E.G.B.', identified by Johnson as Terence Black) 'Two on a Broken Rock'; and (Spring 1962, in which Sinclair is designated as an Old Cheltonian) 'The Angry Silence', reviewing Guy Green's film of that name, the essay 'Is There a Future for the British Cinema?', and the poems 'Claud Eatherly, Hiroshima Pilot', 'A Poem', and 'A Winter Tale'. Sinclair's involvement in plays and sports are noted during the run, and in the Winter 1961 issue he is congratulated on being awarded a prize of one guinea for his literary contributions to the term's Cheltonian. In the same issue, his Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award is reported, and he is listed as a College Prefect. The visit to the house of Dylan Thomas was part of Sinclair's research for his essay 'Dylan Thomas: A Critical Study of a Complex Character', the basis for his being considered for a Trevelyan Scholarship. Sinclair has written his name on the upper wrappers of the first four volumes and on the first page of the fifth volume, his name in a rugby team is underlined, and he or his parents have made some brief, basic notes on the lower wrappers of the first four volumes. Some creasing, rubbing, and soiling, the first and fifth volumes with a few unobtrusive chips between them. - 2. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) GREENWOOD, J. T. et al (eds.). *Image* 2. Cheltenham, nd (1962). 1st edition. Small 4to. Stapled wrappers. [48pp.]. An alternative Cheltenham College magazine to the more formal *Cheltonian*, *Image* was overseen by Sinclair's teacher and house tutor Greenwood (described here as a 'guiding spirit' to the publication). Greenwood gave Sinclair a copy of Jack Kerouac's *Maggie Cassidy*, and is acknowledged by Sinclair as one of his early influences. This issue was produced jointly with Cheltenham Ladies' College. Sinclair contributes the poems 'Troubadour Song 1962' and 'International', and the short story 'Spring Meeting', his first London piece, written while living there, and with a couple of brief corrections in his hand. Sinclair had moved to London in early 1962 to attend the London School of Film Technique. C. Day Lewis also contributes. A tired copy, Fair only, but reasonably sound, and very rare. Johnson C006.

3. SINCLAIR, lain et al (eds.). Icarus 40-42 and 44-50. Dublin: Trinity College, Dublin, 1963-[1966]. 1st editions. 8vo then (issue 48) folio then (issues 49-50) 4to. Stapled wrappers. [40pp.]-[100pp.]. All of Sinclair's contributions to the literary magazine of Trinity College, Dublin, where he studied from September 1962 to May 1966. One issue was published per term, and in theory the magazine could be edited only once by any one person. As follows: (40 (June 1963), ed. Tim Webb) the poems 'Lover Put Away Dreams', 'Reel Love', and 'Grey Mari' by Sinclair, plus Michael Longley; (41 (December 1963), ed. Ian Blake) the poem 'On my immediate Antecedents' by Sinclair, plus Brendan Kennelly, Derek Mahon, Longley, and Annabel Hadman (later Sinclair); (42 (March 1964), ed. Jennifer Greenleaves) the poem 'A Roman Courtship (on the opening sequence of Michaelangelo Antonioni's "L'Eclisse")' by Sinclair, plus Kennelly, Mahon, Longley, Hadman, and Tim Booth (cover); (44 (December 1964), ed. Ranald Graham) the poems 'Cockling' and 'At the Prado' by Sinclair, plus Geoffrey Thurley, Kennelly, Mahon, Longley, and Hadman; (45 (March 1965), ed. Jeremy Lewis) the poem 'The Heiress' by Sinclair (Treasurer for this issue, with Hadman working on its Advertising), plus Brian Patten, Thurley, Kennelly, Mahon, and George Grosz (including the cover); (46 ([mid May 1965]), ed. Sinclair, with Hadman as Advertising Manager) the prose 'Exagminations in Progress' and 'Editorial' and the poems 'Labour Pains (On Hercules Conquers Atlantis by Vittorio Cottafavi)', 'After Stranger Gods (on the cinema of the Marx Brothers)', '"The Lord Loves a Good Rider" (On These Thousand Hills by Richard Fleischer)', and 'The Colours (On the nightclub scene from Imitation of Life by Douglas Sirk)' by Sinclair, plus William S. Burroughs ('A Short Piece'), M. L. (Tony) Lowes, Christopher Bamford, Booth (cover and artwork), Ivan Pawle, Thurley, John Arden, and Mahon; (47 (December 1965), ed. June Rodgers) the poem 'Hopeless (On "That's the way-it should have BEGUN! But it's hopeless! by Roy Lichtenstein)' by Sinclair (listed as Business Manager, with M. L. Lowes), plus Thurley, Mahon, and Hadman (listed as Secretary); (48 ([March 1966]), no editor given) the poems 'The Perceptions' and (with illustrations by Tim Booth) 'Comics Are my Favourite Kind Of Strip' by Sinclair, plus William Carlos Williams, W. H. Auden, Vernon Watkins, Edward Lucie-Smith, Hayden Murphy, Christopher Bamford, Geoffrey Bamford, Thurley, and Kennelly; (49 ([May] 1966), ed. Christopher Bamford, with helpers including Laurence Bicknell (artwork) and Pawle (factotum)) the poem 'Postscript from a Wasted World' by Sinclair, plus Charles Olson ('I, Maximus of Gloucester, to You', 'The Song and Dance of', and 'Tyrian Businesses'),

Bamford (including 'Towards a Note on Charles Olson'), Gael Turnbull, Thurley, and Tim Goulding; (50 ([November 1966]), ed. Tony Lowes) the poems 'Live Horns in Decay (: from The Lusty Men by Nicholas Ray)' and 'Dentist' by Sinclair, plus Seamus Heaney, Murphy, Thurley, Kennelly, and Lowes. Issue 46, the first publication to be edited by Sinclair (and the thickest issue in this collection), is notable for its inclusion of Burroughs (for which see also item 5), although the editor of the subsequent issue notes that the 'last issue... had its wings very badly scorched', leaving the magazine 'floundering in heavy debt'. Yet despite her aim to ensure the magazine's 'future existence', issues 48 and 50 found themselves in trouble. As Johnson notes, issue 48 'caused a scandal when the head of the English Department, Professor Edwards, asked Tony Lowes to voluntarily withdraw the issue from sale, ostensibly to prevent an outright ban by the Board due to its "objectionable style". An amicable agreement was reached whereby the issue would only be sold on campus and not, as was usual, in Dublin bookshops'. Issue 50 went further: 'in a planned, public, theatrical ban', it 'was seized after the first copy was sold, due to lecturer Brendan Kennelly taking offence to a Tony Lowes story, "Funny Boy". The seized copies were pulped', with about 100 copies surviving the ban. All of the issues in this collection are rare, issues 48 and 50 exceptionally so, with issue 46 also being particularly desirable. Very Good overall, with some rubbing and creasing, occasional soiling and unobtrusive discolouration. Issue 44 has a historical vertical fold (mild now), issue 48 is somewhat tired, and issue 49 is sunned to the spine and lower wrapper. The cover of issue 48 is black with white titles and a white silhouette of a nude woman; copies were also available with the colouring reversed. Loosely inserted in issue 47 is a (somewhat worn) card with information for advertisers; the first stanza of Sinclair's 'At the Prado' in issue 44 has been corrected with an affixed slip; and this copy of issue 46 has been signed by Sinclair (once on the front cover and once on the first page), Booth (on the front cover), Pawle, and Christopher Bamford. 4. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) YEATS, Meredith, MACDONALD, Sam, and STOCKEN, Peter (eds. include). A collection of twenty-two issues of TCD Miscellany. Dublin: Trinity College, Dublin, 1963-1966. 1st editions. 4to. Stapled wrappers. 12pp.-24pp. Founded in the late nineteenth century, TCD Miscellany (today entitled MISC. Magazine) is the student magazine of Trinity College, published weekly (in term-time) during the time in question. This collection contains twenty of the twenty-two issues to which Sinclair (usually under a nom de plume) contributed (lacking only issues 1237 and 1244), as follows: (1229, 8 November 1963) the short story 'Neutral' (including a small holograph correction by Sinclair, who has added a brief note elsewhere in the issue); (1236, 21 February 1964) (as 'M. L. Quinlan') 'The Man from Laramie', a review of Anthony Mann's film of that name; (1249, 11 December 1964) 'On Stage, A Letter', responding to a review of his and Chris Bamford's play Cords and Dischords; (1253, 19 February 1965) 'Gunfight at the OK Corral', a review of John Sturges' film of that name; (1262, 5 November 1965) film ratings (on a 1-10 scale) in the 'Lineup' section and (probably by Sinclair) the brief reviews above them, a long piece in which Sinclair is on the set of John Guillermin's The Blue Max, and 'The Clark Kent Column' on film, with Sinclair (as 'Clark Kent') being the magazine's reviewer during Michaelmas Term 1965; (1263, 12 November 1965) film reviews in the 'Lineup' section, and 'The Clark Kent Column', while a letter to the editor takes issue with comments in his Blue Max report; (1264, 19 November 1965) 'The Clark Kent Column', on Jean-Luc Godard's Breathless; (1265, 26 November 1965) film reviews in the 'Lineup' section, and the 'Clark Kent Column'; (1266, 3 December 1965) the 'Clark Kent Column'; (1267, 10 December 1965) film reviews in the 'Lineup' (London Cinema) section, and 'Clark Kent/Elmer Gantry/Clark Gantry/Elmer Kent/Kent Gantry/Elmer Clark/Clark Elmer', on Richard Brooks' Elmer Gantry, while a promotional text for Icarus 47 might or might not be by Sinclair; (1268, 28 January 1966) (as 'St. John Cross', under which name Sinclair wrote a weekly column during Hilary Term 1966) the short story 'Life to Mr. Milton'; (1269, 4 February 1966) (as 'St. John Cross') the poem 'DUBLIN and its lesser peoples', while a letter to the editor from Ian H. Milton responds to the previous week's piece; (1271, 18 February 1966) 'The St. John Cross Column', on a University Philosophical Society (or 'Phil') event, with J. P. Donleavy a "distinguished visitor"; (1272, 25 February 1966) (as 'Simeon ffart') a letter to the editor ('A Load of Krapp') on a review by Tony Lowes of Sinclair's production of Samuel Beckett's Krapp's Last Tape; (1273, 4 March 1966) the poems 'Teddy' (as 'Clark Kent') and 'Edna' (as 'St. John Cross') (with a poem by Annabel Hadman in-between), and (also as 'St. John Cross') the short story 'The Interview of Macintosh Lung'; (1274, 22 April 1966) (as 'Doomesday Wen' (corrected to 'Doomsday Wen' in future issues)) the short story 'Harold and Vivien (or "Which One Will She Choose?")'; (1276, 6 May 1966) 'The Only Monologue of Doomsday Wen; or, The Only Monologue of Doomsday Wen', a prose piece 'Recorded, undelivered to spasmodic applause at the Royal Ambulance Hall, Herne Hill'; (1277, 13 May 1966) the short story 'Doomsday Wen Cries Wolfe!! or 1 Day in the Life of a *'; (1278, 20 May 1966) the short story (by 'Doomsday Wen') 'I Spy, Said the Voyeur'; (1279, 25 May 1966) 'The Particularly Posthumous Diaries of Doomsday Wen'. Also included are issues 1248 (4 December 1964) containing two reviews of Cords and Dischords (one by Lowes), and 1270 (11 February 1966) containing the review by Lowes of Krapp's Last Tape, to both of which issues Sinclair responds in items above. The latter is apparently lacking a Valentine supplement. A few issues have historical folds (mild now), with one issue historically folded in quarters (less mild, but sound). Some soiling, creasing, very occasional discolouration, and light

wear typical of student magazines, but a Very Good collection, extremely rare in any quantity. Johnson C008, C012, C020, C022, C027-C031, C033-C035, C037-C038, C040-C044, and C046.

- 5. [SINCLAIR, Iain, LOWES, Tony, and BAMFORD, Christopher (eds.)]. Albatross. [Dublin], nd (December 1963). Folio. Stab-stapled. 82pp. The planned 'bi-annual literary magazine', never officially published, although about 50 'pilot' copies such as this were printed to raise funds, and it was registered with the copyright libraries. Sinclair writes in The Face on the Fork: A William Burroughs Triptych: 'We sent out flyers to everybody: TS Eliot, Ezra Pound, Paul Bowles, Djuna Barnes, Jean Genet, Groucho Marx. Some of these culture heroes were honoured by additional cards or letters... One person in the universe responded to our request for a contribution: William S. Burroughs of Tangier, Morocco.' Burroughs' 'A Short Piece' 'would be around the fiftieth item in the catalogue of William Burroughs contributions' and 'the first to appear in Ireland', also preceding the 1st UK edition of The Naked Lunch. It is accompanied by a note from the author: 'This is an experiment – one of many possible – in altering the conventional page format and drawing lines of narrative off the page.' Sinclair writes: 'He wanted his text read across and down... But we never figured out, with jobbing Dublin printers, the proper technology for this effect.' With Albatross aborted, Sinclair recycled 'A Short Piece' (and other material from the earlier magazine) in Icarus 46. Other contributors here include John Arden, Brian Patten, Ivan Pawle, Annabel Hadman, Arnold Saland, Israel Kaplan, Russell Mead, Sartit Kridakara, D.R. Geraint Jones, J. W. Purser, Bamford, Lowes, and Sinclair (the poems 'man & acrobat' and 'Stasis of Moon', and the prose poem 'The Edge of the Cup'). About Very Good, all things considered, the front cover with historical creasing (faint now), the blank back cover with three paint marks and a few scuffs, and only the middle of the three staples still penetrating throughout (the whole secure nonetheless). Toning to the first page and final few pages, without much impact, and trivially to some edges, but contents generally clean. Notoriously rare. Johnson B001/C010. £1000
- 6. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) WAINWRIGHT, Jeffrey (ed.). *Poetry & Audience* vol. 11 [Student Poetry Competition issue]. [Leeds], [1964]. 1st edition. 4to. Stab-stapled. 10pp. Sinclair wins third prize (and £1) for 'Girl Underground', about which the editors write that 'The second half... does not carry on sufficiently the strength of the poem's beginning. Its spare, exact description is its best feature, and this Sinclair links beautifully with his communication of the experience. The one grows out of the other.' Also of note is that Angela Carter is recommended for her 'Poem'. The editors describe her as 'Completely new to us. She is a student at Bristol University. Her letter was funny too.' Overall a Good copy of a fragile item, moderately creased, the front cover with a few peripheral chips (not affecting the design), the final page a little soiled. A couple of brief corrections have been made, presumably by Sinclair, to his contributor's note, and there is one apparently superfluous adjustment to the editorial. Johnson C014.

Wrappers. 48pp. Includes 'Cockling' by Sinclair, reprinted from *Icarus* 44, plus work by Angela Carter, D. M. Black, Lionel Kearns, Angus Calder, and Yann Lovelock. Tiny pinprick through the blank lower wrapper and several pages, confined to the inner margin and therefore not overly perceptible. Otherwise Very Good, slightly rubbed. Johnson C026.
- 8. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) SHORT, Phil (ed.). Solstice 1. Cambridge, 1966. 1st edition. 8vo. Stapled wrappers. 40pp. The 'original idea was to provide a magazine for students whose work is of a sufficiently high standard to warrant its publication outside the limited area covered by University Journals', although this scope was 'considerably extended'. Contributors include Sinclair ('Horses'), Tom Raworth, Gael Turnbull, John James, Harry Guest, Spike Hawkins, Clive James, Anselm Hollo, Jeremy Hilton, Jim Burns, Ian Vine, Nick Wayte, and more. Thin strip of fading around the spine, otherwise Very Good overall, the wrappers moderately rubbed and soiled, the blank lower wrapper slightly toned peripherally. Johnson C036.
- 9. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) ARMSTRONG, Keith and GILL, David (eds.). *Informer* vol. 2 no. 8. Oxford: Circle Books, nd (1970). 1st edition. 8vo. Stapled wrappers. 36pp. The penultimate issue. Contributors include Sinclair ('Ever Green', 'Message', and 'Sierra Madre'), Martin Booth, Óndra Łysohorsky, and Lydia Pasternak Slater. Very Good, the wrappers slightly faded around the spine. Johnson C052.
- 10. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) MURPHY, Hayden (ed.). *Broadsheet* 10. Dublin, nd (1970). 1st edition. One of 1000 numbered copies (this copy unnumbered). Six folio sheets, each printed on both sides and folded twice, held in a printed envelope. Contributors to this varied and colourful issue include Bob Cobbing, Ernst Jandl, Raoul Hausmann, Jiří Valoch, Tom Raworth, Emmett Williams, Jochen Gerz, George Dowden, Thomas A Clark, Edwin Morgan, Pete Brown, Andrew Lloyd, Michael Horovitz, Frances Horovitz, John Heath-Stubbs, Geoffrey Thurley, Brendan Kennelly, Murphy, Sinclair

('Degas With Kodak' and 'Another Surburban Arab' (sic)), and many more. Sheets Very Good Plus in somewhat worn (but sound) envelope, with an address label for Jeff Nuttall. Johnson C053.

- 11. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) MCCRINDLE, J. F. (ed.). *The Transatlantic Review* 36. London and New York, NY, Summer 1970. 1st edition. 8vo. Wrappers. 160pp. Sinclair contributes the poem 'Some Are Females With Obscene Muse' to 'A selection of Recent Scottish Poetry'. Also B. S. Johnson, Jean Rhys (interview), Ted Hughes, Philip O'Connor, Ruth Fainlight, George Mackay Brown, Edwin Morgan, Robin Fulton, and more. Nick to head edge of lower wrapper and final leaf, slight soiling around the spine tail, but Very Good overall. Johnson C055.
- 12. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) No editor given. *Joint* 5. Loughton, [1970]. 1st edition. 4to. Stab-stapled. Unpaginated (20pp.). Sinclair contributes six poems to this extremely rare magazine, published by students at Loughton College. Geoff Hardy was one of apparently more-than-one editors. The cover shows a photograph of Jimi Hendrix, who had just died. A Good copy, all things considered, with historical folds (fairly mild now), and a small stain inside the front cover, without much impact. Johnson C056.
- 13. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) MURPHY, Hayden (ed.). *Broadsheet* 12. Dublin, nd (1971). 1st edition. One of 1000 numbered copies (this copy unnumbered). Folio. Single sheet, printed on both sides. Contributors include Sinclair ('Reynolds Admired' and 'Head of a Southern Man'), Dom Silvester Houédard, Emmett Williams, Jeff Nuttall, George Dowden, P. J. Kavanagh, Benedict Ryan, and Rasul Gamzatov (translated by Edwin Morgan). Folded four times, rather creased and edgeworn, a little soiled, but about Good, considering the format. This copy is held in a (worn) *Broadsheet* 10 envelope (see item 10), incongruous but with an address label for John Heath-Stubbs. Johnson C058.
- 14. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) FINCH, Peter (ed.). Second Aeon 14. Cardiff: Second Aeon Publications, nd (1971). 1st edition. 8vo. Wrappers. 132pp. Cover by Jochen Gerz. Sinclair contributes the poem 'Chalk Orchid' plus excerpts from *The Kodak Mantra Diaries*. Also Charles Bukowski, Tom Phillips, Chris Torrance, Opal L. Nations, Bill Butler, Jiří Valoch, and many more. Reading crease to the spine, and gaping at one point accordingly, but secure. Overall about Very Good, slightly rubbed. Johnson C059.
- 15. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) ELLIOTT, Tony (ed.). *Time Out* 106. London: Time Out Ltd, 25 February-2 March [1972]. 1st edition. 4to. Stapled wrappers. 64pp. Iain and Anna Sinclair, Renchi and Judith Bicknell, and Tony Lowes are interviewed about Albion Village Press in 'The Albion Village Press or The Ultimate Pinecone', illustrated with photographs and a drawing. A Good copy, somewhat worn but sound. Johnson C064.
- 16. (SINCLAIR, Iain.) HIDDEN, Norman (ed.). Workshop New Poetry 14. London: Workshop Press, [1972]. 1st edition. 8vo. Stapled wrappers. 36pp. This issue edited by Michael Johnson. Contributors include Sinclair ('Beside a Swiss Lake'), Adrian Henri, Marilyn Hacker, Laurence Lerner, and more. Good, slightly rubbed and marked, the last few pages with a rusty paperclip impression (without much impact). The date of 17 April 1972 is neatly given in pen on the upper wrapper, presumably in Sinclair's hand. Johnson C065.
